

Medical Library Named in Honor Of Dr. G. B. Webb

The medical library at Penrose Hospital is a memorial to a doctor who served for more than half a century on the staff of the "old" Glockner-Penrose Hospital and who was one of the pioneers in tuberculosis research.

The library on the first floor of the new hospital carries the name of "The Dr. Gerald Bertram Webb Memorial Library," a facility created thru efforts of a committee which was formed to honor the pioneer after plans were announced for the new hospital.

Dr. Webb, born in 1871, in Cheltenham, England came to Denver in 1893 for his wife's

health. Mrs. Webb died of tuberculosis in Colorado Springs in 1903. The doctor was later married to Varnia Howell Davis Hayes, granddaughter of Jefferson Davis, president of the Confederacy. She died in 1934.

A topflight researcher in the tuberculosis field, Dr. Webb represented the United States at medical conferences in London, Paris and Rome. He founded the Colorado Foundation for Research in Tuberculosis in 1924, was a charter member of the El Paso County Tuberculosis Association. Dr. Webb died in 1948.

In recognition for his services to the community and to the

world, a committee canvassed professional and lay people in obtaining the funds which led to creation of the extensive library in the new hospital. On the committee were Mrs. William H. Evans, chairman; Jefferson Hayes Davis, Dr. Harold H. Giles, Dr. John L. McDonald, Mrs. F. B. Robbins, Dr. John A. Sevier and Dr. James J. Waring.
